Seven Churches in Revelation

Revelation chapters 2 and 3 mention seven churches addressed by the Apostle John.

These churches are generally believed to have been established between AD 52 and 60. The church in Ephesus was founded during Paul's second missionary journey and later received his teaching and guidance for about two years during his third missionary journey. The other churches were most likely founded by Paul's co-workers and through the missionary influence that flowed out from Ephesus.

Through these seven churches, Jesus clearly shows which churches receive praise and which receive rebuke. Historically, the average lifespan of a church is often said to be about 70 years. When Revelation was written nearly 2,000 years ago, these churches were faithfully carrying out their respective missions and were approximately 30–40 years old. It implies that these churches stood at a critical crossroads: would they renew themselves in response to Jesus' praise and correction, or would they decline and disappear under Roman persecution?

The seven churches were not small congregations. For example, in Ephesus, Paul taught the word of God daily in the hall of Tyrannus for two years during his third missionary journey (Acts 19:9–10; AD 53–57). As a result, *"all who lived in Asia, both Jews and Greeks, heard the word of the Lord."* Ephesus became a major hub for missionary work in Asia, and through it, the other churches mentioned in Revelation—Smyrna, Pergamum, Thyatira, Sardis, Philadelphia, and Laodicea—were naturally established.

However, Jesus did not praise these churches simply because of their size or influence. Jesus rebuked the church in Ephesus for having abandoned its first love. Contemporary missiologists often describe the churches that Jesus commended as *healthy churches*, not necessarily large ones. Even today, the church around the world continues to carry out its missions under persecution. They are small, but they are strong.



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However, history shows that the church does not disappear because of persecution. On the contrary, the church has often become spiritually compromised during times of peace and stability. Under persecution, the church is purified, experiences the power of the Holy Spirit, and is given opportunities for genuine spiritual renewal.

At the heart of spiritual renewal lies the renewal of worship. Worship is a spiritual encounter in which we enter God's presence. Through worship, our spirits are renewed, and our souls are empowered by the Holy Spirit. Then we are sent into the world to live out a transforming ministry of service. In this light, it is helpful to reflect on the three altars Abraham built during his early life in Canaan.

The first altar, built at Shechem (Genesis 12:6–7), shows that divine strength flows from God's word and revelation. The second altar, built between Bethel and Ai (Genesis 12:8–9), represents the moment of choice—whether we will live according to God's will or our own will shaped by the world. At such crossroads, we must continually seek and depend on the Lord. The third altar, built at Hebron (Genesis 13:14–18), signifies that through fellowship with God, we experience restoration by God's grace through the work of the Holy Spirit.

These are the blessings we experience through faithful worship in our daily lives. Like the churches in Revelation, we too stand at a crossroads and must make intentional spiritual choices. God speaks through the prophet Jeremiah: "*You will seek me and find me when you seek me with all your heart*" (Jeremiah 29:13).

I hope and pray that God will bless everyone in the Skipwith family and community as we faithfully build an altar of worship to the Lord every day.

A Message from the Leadership Council

Skipwith Family,

As those of you who have been present at worship service on a regular basis have noticed, we have an abundance of empty pew seats on Sunday mornings. At our peak, we were averaging over 120 attendees each week. Attendance has recently been in the 25 to 30 range with about half of that being the choir. Such decline is indicative of a comparable decrease in giving.

To meet our current budget requirements, we need to average just over \$4,000 in contributions each week. In the first six months of this fiscal year, we averaged about \$2,900 per Sunday. As of December 31, our cash position was less than \$1,000 above what we need to cover funds reserved for Special Accounts such as the Memorial Fund, Missions, Backpack Ministry, and the Columbarium Fund.

The challenges we face involve capacity and sustainability, i.e., we have fewer givers that can continue covering the cost of operating a church, which includes employee salaries, contract workers, and operational expenses. This spring we plan to initiate a spirited Stewardship campaign with the hope of improving our financial situation. Our goal is ambitious and may not result in all that is needed to continue the level of operation that we have been accustomed to for so many years. However, as members of Skipwith United Methodist Church, we want to make our situation known to all.

The Leadership Council knows that Skipwith is near and dear to our members. We have been recognized in the community and at the state conference for the vast amount of mission work that is completed by our small church. Let's turn our love for Skipwith into positive financial actions this year so that our work can continue.

Thank you for your prayers and faith that God will be with us as we go forth.

Safe Harbors Visits Skipwith

The United Women in Faith learned a great deal from our January guest speaker from Safe Harbors. The outreach director, Ms. Tyler Wallace, shared the purpose and functions of the mission which fights domestic abuse and human trafficking. In Henrico County, they have served 17,000 clients since opening in 2000. While they do receive some government funding, they rely on donations and volunteers to exist. They support survivors through emergency housing, counseling, independent living skill instruction, financial management skills, job interview practice, assistance with the judicial system, clothing, and any other need that is preventing the victim from independence. Henrico County has prosecuted 152 individuals for charges related to human trafficking. Since sexual trafficking is a \$150 billion industry, it continues to increase. Our eyes and hearts were opened by the incredible work of this organization. Our circle donated \$150. to Safe Harbors and many supplies that they can use in their four emergency houses.
